January Virtue: Gratitude

Gratitude – seeing everything as a gift from God and being thankful

"Rejoice always, pray constantly, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18). Giving thanks in all circumstances does not always seem possible. There are many times in which we do not want to give thanks.


Gratitude is a fundamental tenet of the Catholic faith and one of the most important virtues for us to foster. It is deeply woven into the fabric of daily life. This sentiment is not confined to grand gestures or momentous occasions; instead, it is cultivated in the small, everyday acts of acknowledging and appreciating the blessings received from God. Even the difficulties in our life, which God allows for the greater good of our salvation.

Gratitude is one of the greatest spiritual medicines of all time. It is one of the most powerful antidotes to self-pity, envy, resentment, and pride. Nothing frustrates the devil more than a human being who is grateful to God.

So what does gratitude do for you?

According to Chris Stefanick, we receive 5 benefits when we practice the virtue of gratitude:

- Gratitude unlocks your power to enjoy your life. Gratitude is the key that will unlock the smile on your face. God wants you to enjoy your life.
- Gratitude generates feelings that make you more successful. When you focus on what makes you grateful, it releases serotonin and dopamine — real performance enhancers. It also lights up the part of your brain associated with learning and problem-solving.
- Gratitude makes you a blessing magnet. If you say "thank you" to people all the time, they just want to give you more. This also applies to God.
- Gratitude gives you a victorious attitude and changes you from a victim to a victor.
- Gratitude preserves the relationships in your life.



Saint Francis of Assisi was a Catholic friar who gave up a life of wealth to live a life of poverty. He established the Franciscan Order of friars and the women's Order of the Poor Ladies.

Francis was born in Assisi, Italy in 1182. He grew up leading a privileged life as the son of a wealthy cloth merchant. His father wanted him to become a businessman. About the age of nineteen Francis went to battle against the nearby town of Perugia. Francis was captured and taken prisoner. He was held prisoner in a dungeon for a year before he was set free.

Over the next few years Francis began to see visions from God that changed his life. Finally, when praying in a church, Francis heard God tell him to "repair my church, which is falling in ruins." Francis gave all his money to the church. His father became very angry with him. Francis then left his father's home and took a vow of poverty.

As Francis lived his life of poverty and preached to people about the life of Jesus Christ, people began to follow him. He had one basic rule which was "To follow the teachings of our Lord Jesus Christ and to walk in his footsteps". He and his followers traveled to Rome to get the approval for their religious Order from the pope.

Francis became ill and spent the last few years of his life mostly blind. He died in 1226 while singing Psalm 141. He was declared a saint of the Catholic Church only two years after his death.

Interesting Facts about Saint Francis of Assisi

- October 4th is observed as Saint Francis' feast day.
- It is said that he received the stigmata two years before he died. This was the wounds of Christ from the cross including his hands, feet, and side.
- Francis set up the first known Nativity scene to celebrate Christmas in 1220.
- He believed that actions were the best example, telling his followers to "Preach the Gospel at all times and when necessary use words."
